Dear Patrons:

The students and staff have been very busy since their return back to start the second semester. Both our elementary and high school students in grades 2-11 have taken the second round of Maps/NSCAS testing. The scores from this testing cycle will be used to help improve curriculum goals.

At the beginning of each semester students are given a chance to drop and add courses. With this process the student must get the signature of the teacher's class they're dropping and from the teacher they're adding. They're also expected to get a parent signature so they're aware of the change as well. To end the process, Mr. Stithem looks over the form and makes sure the change is being done for correct purposes. Mrs. Fischer also checks the student's transcript to make sure it doesn't affect their graduation requirements.

SSCS is in the process of getting a new K-12 Math curriculum for the 2023-2024 school year to better align with the state's new Math Standards. Mrs. Nemecek has been put in charge of the selection process and is doing a great job. Caryn Ziettlow (ESU consultant) has also been here to assist our staff as they review several Math samples.

The basketball and wrestling teams continue their seasons with upcoming conference competitions and several games/meets to be held in the month of February. As always, we encourage everyone to come and support our student-athletes during these competitions.

It is my hope that everyone had an enjoyable Holiday with families. I am grateful for the opportunity to greet students as they come back from break so excited to share their holiday stories.

Since November of 2021 the School Board has been working with DLR Group (an architectural firm) to conduct a facility study to help the board set long range goals for the facility and program needs of the school district. DLR staff have interviewed staff, shadowed students, and conducted preliminary studies examining classroom sizes, traffic flow, etc. In the meantime, the Board has also enlisted the services of staff from the Nebraska Association of School Boards (NASB) to facilitate a Strategic Planning Process. From the information gathered by this process coupled with the facility study process, I believe that the Board will have collected valuable data to set goals to propel this district for the future. We see this process as a beginning of an exciting future for Scribner-Snyder Community Schools. Ultimately, this process is about all of you, our valued students, staff, and community and our commitment to providing the kind of environment that will allow all to thrive. Thank you for your support, dedication, and commitment to SSCS. We plan to have another community engagement meeting in early February. Keep an eye out for an invitation.

I am pleased to announce that the School Board unanimously voted to accept my recommendation to hire Malia Nemecek to replace retiring Principal Brad Stithem as the PK-12 Principal starting with the 23/24 school year. Beginning her teaching career in 2012, Mrs. Nemecek taught for 9 years at Clarkson Elementary school in Clarkson, Nebraska. She came to Scribner-Snyder Schools 2 years ago as the Activities Director and Director of Data and Student Services. She is a 1993 graduate of Scribner-Snyder and has tremendous pride in our two communities. She has demonstrated exceptional leadership skills and has worked to support students, teachers and our communities. I am confident in her ability to lead our school and cultivate a positive school culture.

Mr. Stithem's retirement announcement from SSCS comes after 12 years of service to this community. Mr. Stithem has 35 years of educational experience in all. The spring semester is looking to be a busy one for the Scribner-Snyder FFA Chapter!

This semester is filled with applications, contests, events, conventions, banquet, and more.

Proficiency and State Degree applications are due at the beginning of February. We have one member, Addison Lange, applying for her State Degree. Along with an application, there is also an interview process that must be completed for this. The State Degree is the highest award that the state association can bestow upon its members. A minimum requirement for time and/or money invested in a supervised agricultural experience, FFA activities, community service hours, etc. must be achieved to attain this recognition. Agricultural Proficiency Awards honor FFA members who, through <u>supervised</u> <u>agricultural experiences</u>, have developed specialized skills that they can apply toward their future careers. Students can compete for awards in nearly 50 areas ranging from agricultural communications to wildlife management. We have several students who will compete in areas like Hospitality and Management, Poultry Production, and Equine Placement. The application for this consists of several short answer questions, financial statements, skill and competencies reflections, and photos.

FFA Week activities are also in the planning stages! Scribner-Snyder FFA enjoys celebrating the National FFA Organization and promoting FFA to our school and community. Face painting for the elementary students, drive your farm machinery to school day, official dress day, snack attack (providing a snack to the junior high and high school students), agricultural trivia, the hidden owl, and elementary lessons are just a few of the activities that are planned for National FFA Week **(February 20-25)**. This helps the chapter to let the school and community know more about agriculture and the National FFA Organization.

The Scribner-Snyder FFA BBQ and Pie Auction is set for **Tuesday, March 14th**! We look forward to the silent auction, labor and pie auction, meal, and gathering of community members. FFA members will again be baking some homemade pies (and cheesecakes), available for your bidding and enjoyment! Each FFA member will also be auctioned off in the labor auction. Each high school member will be sold to the highest bidder for eight hours of labor. Along with the labor and pie auction live auction; there will also be a silent auction. As we receive prizes we will post them on our facebook pages so you can see the items we have up for bid. The evening will also have a smoked and shredded barbeque pork supper served. This meal consists of a shredded pork sandwich, salad (potato or Aide's macaroni), chips, beans, dessert, and a drink. The meal will be served from 5:30-7:30 pm. Cost for the meal will be a free will donation. The labor and pie auction will begin at 6:45 pm. Following the labor and pie auction the silent auction will close. Some children's games and activities will also be sponsored, to engage the kids in agricultural literacy information throughout the evening. This event helps the chapter to pay for state and national conventions, contests, and other expenses! The Scribner-Snyder FFA members work hard to prepare for the evening, we hope that you are able to join us for the fun.

A few students from Scribner-Snyder are excited to participate in The World Food Prize, Nebraska Youth Institute in April. This event takes place at the University of Nebraska – Lincoln. The goal of this institute is to help students engage in ending hunger and poverty. Students research a country with a global challenge, write a paper about that country, and propose a solution to their problem. These students earn a \$500 College of Agricultural Sciences and Natural Resources scholarship and become recognized as Borlaug Scholars.

We would like to send out a **special shout out** to those from our community that donated their time to judge our Leadership Development Events last fall: Mishele and Dan Beerbohm, Pastor Bruce Schut, Jordan Young, Becky Hull, Arlene Alsmeyer, and Beth Boyle. This contest would not be possible without the generosity of their time!

Community service is another area in which our chapter is always trying to fulfill. Last fall we held a food drive at the school. This yielded over **950 items** to go toward the **Faith Food Pantry**! Any opportunity in which we can give back to our community, we are more than happy to do so.

Coming up this spring, the Scribner-Snyder FFA members are also looking forward to participating in District Career Development Events and the Nebraska State FFA Convention. State Convention is three days which provide so many opportunities for our students. We have several students earning the right to compete in contests including: Natural Resources, Meats, Employment Skills (Hannah Ryun), Junior Public Speaking (Zoey Gathman), and Agriscience. In addition to contests, we are hoping to have a display for the hall of chapters. The junior high members enjoy participating in the Quiz Bowl at State Convention. Shortly after convention is over, we will be holding chapter officer interviews and our recognition banquet **(April 24th)**. May brings our petting zoo, family picnic, and Chapter Officer Leadership Training.



Although there are many benefits to donating blood, donations made during the month of March will qualify donors for a \$10 visa prepaid card. In addition, the number of units collected through the school's blood drive translates into a \$250-\$500 scholarship for a local Scribner-Snyder senior. Donors that are interested in making an appointment are encouraged to sign up online or contact the school at 402-664-2567.

Find upcoming scholarships

Peak scholarship time for high school seniors is between January and April of your senior year. Now is a great time to find some good scholarship resources. Talk to your school counselor about local scholarships, look at some college websites to see what financial aid packages they offer, and check out online scholarship searches. *ScholarshipQuest* is a great online resource for Nebraska-based awards!

Gather your information.

Most scholarship applications have similar components. If you have all of the following information in one place to start, it will make the process a lot easier.

- Your contact information (address, phone number, email address)
- Academic information (your GPA, ACT scores, class rank, transcripts, etc.)
- Financial information (fill out the FAFSA if you haven't already!)
- Your high school activities and accomplishments (Activities Resume is a great way to compile this information)



Research essay topics.

You should always tailor your essay to the specific scholarship application, but that doesn't mean that you can't prepare in advance. There are a handful of essay questions that you are sure to encounter when applying for scholarships, and now is the perfect time to put some ideas together. You can find several lists of essay prompts online, but here are a few common questions to get you started:

- Tell us why you deserve this scholarship.
- What major/career do you want to go into, and why?
- Talk about a time that you overcame adversity.
- What are your long-term goals?
- How has a certain person/experience influenced you?
- What are your greatest accomplishments?
- How will this scholarship help you?

Pick your recommenders.

Take some time to make a list of 3-5 (or more) people who might be willing to write a recommendation for you. You want to find adults who know you well, who have seen you in a positive light, and who are trustworthy. Remember, no family members allowed! Some options for potential recommenders are teachers, school counselors, coaches, religious leaders, mentors, or work/volunteer supervisors.

After you have your list, ask them if they would be willing to write a letter of recommendation for you when the time comes. Having a pool of recommenders will save you time later.

Make a plan.

Now that you have gathered most of the components for your application, it's time to get organized. When can you set aside time each week to work on scholarship applications? How are you going to track deadlines? Who can help you proofread your applications? No matter what approach you take, creating a manageable plan will make the scholarship process much less overwhelming. Now get out there and start applying!
