Card Readers to be installed at S-S

The safety and security of our students is not a matter we take lightly. With that in mind, Scribner-Snyder will be implementing some changes in the very near future. These changes will affect everyone. We understand that it may be frustrating to all involved. Just know this is not our intention.

Since I have been Superintendent here, we have had concern voiced to us about our open campus and the amount of doors that remain unlocked on a daily basis. With that in mind, we will be having card readers installed on various doors with the remaining doors staying locked. Appropriate students and staff will be issued cards so they can move around the campus. Those that want to visit are asked to use the two main doors. These doors will have cameras and instructions on entering. More information will be available when the readers have been installed.

On another note, Scribner-Snyder Community Schools is having a School Improvement visit. This process happens every five years. This process brings in an outside team of professional educators to evaluate and write a report recommending a school for accreditation or not. The Advance Ed (formerly North Central) School Accreditation team will be at SSCS February 19-21, 2017. Part of this process is to talk to community stakeholders, parents, and business leaders. This team will be in our school and community asking questions.

We want to welcome everyone back to the second semester at Scribner-Snyder Community School. The students and staff have been very busy since their return to school. The basketball and wrestling seasons are in full swing which many games and meet taking place throughout the months of February and March. We encourage you to come out and support the kids.

New this year, we added some classes to our course schedule. Peru State College offered a new dual credit course called, "Human Growth and Development". We've also added a new business class called, "Entrepreneurship" over our distance learning system. This course originates out of Pleasanton Public School. Our coding teacher, Linda Schafer, also added some new courses to her class schedule including: 3-D Advanced Gameit, Web Design, and two seniors are working on advance coding class with a company out of Fremont called the Fremont Creative Collective Organization. Mr. McDuffee is teaching a new physical fitness class and Mrs. Ryun added an Advanced Welding/Woods class to her schedule as well.

We're also excited to have a new High Ability Learner (HAL) teacher, Mrs. Kim Drey has taken over the program this year. Currently we offer HAL to elementary students in grades 3-4-5-6. Mrs. Drey has changed the HAL program to focus more on hands-on learning with higher-level thinking skills. The HAL class recently used the school's 3-D Printer to create cookie cutters that the students were allowed to take home and give to their parents as a Christmas present. Eventually, we hoping to extend the HAL class to more classes/students so more individuals have an opportunity to participate in this program.

The second round of our DIBELS Next testing took place in December prior to Christmas break. A data retreat was held to review the testing results on Friday, January 20th during our teacher in-service day. The teachers and Rtl staff are using the results of this testing to examine how well our Rtl procedures are working to assistance our struggling students to improve their reading skills.

We'd like to thank everyone who attended and contributed to the Lass/Dominguez Fundraiser/Clothing Drive held on January 19th during the home basketball games. Since the family lost all their belongings and home in a house fire on January 6th, the community response has been outstanding. A special thanks also goes out the SSCS's Community Service Club, FCCLA and FFA for organizing and running the fundraiser.

Junior High Family Consumer Science classes will be working on a microwave unit this quarter where they will learn about microwave safety and uses, as well as some easy recipes they can make at home. We also plan to learn the basics of sewing by learning how to sew on a button and do patches. Next quarter they will be learning about relationships and how to spot unhealthy ones and what they should do if that happens.

Foreign

Spanish One is busy learning vocabulary such as school and house items, family members and food. Ask them to show you their family tree and descriptive posters! They will be taking a field trip to a restaurant later in the year to practice ordering in Spanish. They are also working on reinforcing their English grammar by reviewing nouns, articles, adjectives, subject pronouns, and verb conjugations.

Language



Scribner Snyder is proud to have two options for foreign language. The French II boys are learning similar things to the Spanish II students- sports, airport/train station vocabulary, past tense conjugations and lots of irregular conjugations in the present tense. You may catch them singing any number of songs to help them remember their verb charts. They will also be taking a field trip to a restaurant in order to put their French skills to the test.

Spanish II is also fine tuning their grammar skills with more complex parts of speech like prepositions, direct and indirect object pronouns, and adverbs. They have learned how to speak in the past tense and their vocabulary has been centered around vacations and free time, with such subjects as sports, parties, movies, concerts, and winter/summer resorts.

This is the second year of our Spanish III program and I hope it continues to grow. Their vocabulary is a more in depth look at some of the earlier subjects like housing and restaurants, as well as new subjects like traveling and technology. They spend a lot more time on irregular verb conjugations and more complex tenses like passive voice, imperfect, conditional, subjunctive, and future tenses.

*Learning a foreign language can be difficult for some students as it's so unlike the other subjects they've been studying for. Please encourage them to look over vocabulary and notes for a little bit every night and not wait to cram the night before. Flash cards are very helpful as a quick and easy review. What is happening in Art this year?

K- 6- Students have been learning to recognize the elements of line, shape, color, space, texture, and the principles of repetition/pattern, contrast/variety. They have worked on projects relating to these elements and principles. We have focused on themes each month. For example: *space* as it relates to near and far and perspective. They will have a portfolio at the end of the year.

7-8- Students have just returned to art this quarter. Students will be studying the elements of art: (line, shape, value, texture, space, shape & form). They are working on an Elements of Art sampler describing the elements in pictures. The objectives are for them to recognize the elements of art, find ways to demonstrate that knowledge, and evaluate and create art using different media. They will have a small portfolio at the end of the 3rd & 4th quarters.

High school art- Students continue working on developing and mastering skills required for demonstrating their knowledge of the elements and principles of art. It is important that students: 1) understand the application of art concepts and art skills, 2) demonstrate craftsmanship and control of the medium of the artwork being produced, 3) follow the processes and procedures of proper use of art materials and art space, and 4) produce work that is creative and unique to self. Students will have a portfolio at the end of the semester/year. Students have just completed the clay unit and are moving into the painting unit where we focus on a particular artist's style. Objectives for projects include: recognizing the elements and principles of art, applying blending techniques, experimenting with multi-step projects, learning various techniques, evaluating and journaling about art works. They will have a portfolio at the end of the year.



High School English Newsletter


The end of the school is in sight(!), but students taking high school English classes still have a lot to learn before summer!


