We are off and exploring!

In 7th grade World History we have already explored the Israelites, Phoenicians, Lydian's and Persians. The students got to choose a topic and write a five paragraph essay and share it with the rest of their class in the form of a power point presentation.

Student Opportunities in FFA

This fall, students involved in the Scribner-Snyder FFA Chapter have a variety of opportunities to take advantage of. First of all, chapter members are taking part in the Nebraska Farm Bureau's Connecting Chapters program. This is designed to help chapter member's present lessons to the elementary about agricultural literacy. Our first step is to attend a training. Next we read a book to elementary classrooms (and donate the book), and perform agricultural literacy lessons in the classrooms. The chapter will then work with the Dodge County Farm Bureau to do another ag literacy project in the area. Last year, the Scribner-Snyder FFA chapter set up in the KidZone at the Dodge County fairgrounds and talked to kids about farm and animal safety.



FFA members participated in Connecting Chapters, an activity sponsored by the Nebraska Farm Bureau to help high school students be good advocates for agriculture and teach Ag literacy lessons to younger students.



Students recently attended Husker Harvest Days near Grand Island. While there, students visited a company or organization representing each agriculture and natural resources career pathway and engaged in a discussions and completed tasks with the vendors. They also donated over 90 lbs. of food to the Heartland Food Pantry.

Other events coming up this fall include community service opportunities like serving at the Faith Food Pantry, cleaning up trash along the highway, and hosting a food drive at the school. Competitions that Scribner-Snyder FFA students can participate in this fall include Dairy Judging, Land Evaluation, and Leadership

Development Events. In preparation for Leadership Development Events, the chapter also holds a local event we call Greenhand Night (Nov. 19th). This night gives members who are presenting the FFA Creed, agricultural demonstrations, or other agricultural speeches a practice run and helps them prepare for the district competition. EDGE Conference is an additional leadership development opportunity for our students. The breakouts will be by grade. Each group has one communication session, one leadership session, and one agriculture focused session. Of course, our annual fundraiser of fruit sales will be coming up this fall, also! We enjoy providing great products to our customers while also raising funds for our chapter. Orders will be due before the Thanksgiving break and will be delivered during the second week of December.



Finally, we try to have a few activities for the students to just get together and have a fun. This may include a bon fire, pumpkin carving, and a holiday party. We are also planning work nights throughout the semester to allow students time to prepare for contests and complete their record books and award applications.



Training sessions

Students were involved in many hands-on break-out sessions that discussed the medical career paths provided at NECC. Sessions included: EMS/Paramedic station where students were able to perform compressions. They also got to administer medication and interact with patient simulation mannequins.

Seniors...beginning October 1, you and your parents can complete the 2020-21 [FAFSA](#) (Free Application for Federal Student Aid). The FAFSA is the application for state, federal, and college-based financial aid.

Follow these tips to prepare:

Create a Federal Student Aid ID (FSA ID) for you and one for a parent at fsaid.ed.gov. You and a parent will each need an FSA ID to access and sign the FAFSA.

Winning the scholarship game

Follow these tips to increase your chances of earning scholarships

Don't pay for scholarship services! Free resources include ScholarshipQuest at EducationQuest.org, your school counselor's office, and EducationQuest offices in Omaha, Lincoln, and Kearney.

Focus on college-based and local scholarships. You're more likely to earn them over large national awards.

Continually update your activities, honors, and volunteer or paid jobs using the Activities Resume at EducationQuest.org.

Earn the best possible ACT/SAT scores by taking the exams in the spring of your junior year and again in the fall of your senior year.

Use quality references such as a teacher, coach or counselor. Give them advance notice, a specific deadline, and a copy of your Activities Resume. Ask at least two people to proofread your application.


Scribner-Snyder and Logan View athletes along with their parents will be honored during the month of October. They will be recognized on:

Preschool News

Four-year old Preschool is off to an awesome start this year! We have 2 sessions, a morning and an afternoon. Both sessions are filled with curious, creative, bright and funny 4 and 5 year olds! Right now, we have 8 students in the morning and 7 in the afternoon. It is so incredible (and entertaining!) to hear some of the vocabulary and language skills my students use in casual conversations with me. It's no wonder that I'm constantly writing down Preschooler quotes, such as, "My buddy had to write a bunch of 3s at home and when his mom came home he said, 'This 3's exhausting'", and "My grandma took the black seeds out of the watermelon so you can't turn into a watermelon...the white seeds are healthy" or "If you get bitten by a radioactive spider you get to turn into Spiderman, if you get bitten by a regular spider you can turn into, uh...Spiderwoman". The imagination and creativity I witness in my classroom every day is, at times, surprising and always rewarding. In the Art Center I've heard, "It's a salamander" and "It's a police officer robot". The Block and Dramatic Play Areas are great ones to witness inventiveness and creativity as well..."It's a castle with a mote" or "Doctor, doctor, I need help, my sink's overflowing!".

So far, we are working on the letters Aa, Bb, Cc and Dd and going on "Letter Hunts" around the classroom. It's so fun to see how excited the students get when they "discover" the letters in print around the room. We have also been learning about our 5 Senses, exploring different things we can hear, see, smell, taste and touch. It's so exciting and rewarding to see how much progress my little ones make, not only over the course of the school year, but even in a few week's time. Preschool for 3-year-olds will begin on Wednesday, October 2nd this year, beginning at 8:00 a.m. with breakfast at school and ending at 10:30 a.m. Time flies when you're having fun, so we will be celebrating the 100th day of Preschool before you know it!. ☺

Physical Education—Mr. Kellough

Advanced PE has been working on flexibility, weights and lifetime games and activities. Units have been covered in volleyball, badminton and currently pickleball. Pickleball has grown in popularity immensely over the last 10 years.

9th Health will soon be covering units in stress, healthy relationships, fitness and nutrition.

Upper elementary PE classes have spent time on fundamental manipulative movements as well as leisure time activities and games. Sportsmanship education will be a focus in the 5th and 6th grades. Lower elementary PE classes have been working on locomotor and non-locomotor skills, movement experiences and body mechanics.

HAL students are brainstorming

The projects and activities we complete and participate in this year's HAL classes will be based on the STEAM model. STEAM stands for Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, and Math. Before, during, and after each activity the students will discuss which of these areas the activity touched on. The first project this year, touched on all five.

This year's 3rd – 6th grade HAL students started with a prosthetic hand project. The first thing we did was brainstorm a list of reasons why someone might need a prosthetic hand. After coming up with that list, we then looked at an x-ray of a human hand. We talked about everything from the bones that make up the hand and wrist, there are 27, to the growth plates between your joints.

We decided that different people might need different kinds of prosthetics based on their stage in life and their occupations and recreation activities. We then made a simple hand using paper, straws, tape, and twine.

The straws were our bones and the twine was the muscles, tendons, and ligaments that help our fingers move. We found out that our joints are so important in helping our fingers move. We also discussed a little about arthritis and what that can do to the look and mobility of your hand.

After our hands were complete, we watched a couple of videos about the prosthetics of today. One story followed a woman who had lost most of her arm to a raccoon bite but because of special surgeries she's had, depending on what the fingers of her prosthetic touched, technology allows her to have finger feeling in the upper part of her arm because of certain nerves and sensors.

Another woman was born without a hand and she has designed her own prosthetic. She wants to break the stigma of people with prosthetics so the covering on her new hand looks completely different than skin. It is metallic and has lights that glow. She wants people to notice it right away and ask about it instead of pretending not to see it.

The 5th -6th graders have moved on to their next project which is to build replicas of famous manmade and natural landmarks using LEGOS. We hope to have them displayed when they are complete.
