It is hard to believe we're at that time of the year where we're talking about the end of the school year activities. With spring comes a variety of events and it seems like our students spend about the same amount of time out of school as in school.

The annual Senior Sneak Trip will be held on April 16-17-18. Mrs. Fischer and Mrs. Schafer are the senior class sponsors and always do an outstanding job getting this trip organized. The seniors are changing it up as they usually go to Wyoming skiing, however, this year the class has decided to go to Kansas City.

Prom is scheduled for Saturday, April 24. This year's event will take place in the elementary gymnasium. Our seniors will be graduating from SSCS on Saturday, May 8 (time –TBA). Please come and enjoy this special day with our senior class. The school year is set to end on Friday, May 14, and will be here before we know it.

As we head into the last part of the year we hope everyone has a safe and productive spring. We're looking forward to having a great end to the school year.

conducts the University choir there. Johnston has conducted more than 40 choral festivals throughout the Midwest.



AMERICAN RED CROSS BLOOD DRIVE

On Monday, March 22nd, 2021, Scribner-Snyder Community schools hosted its semesterly blood drive. The blood drive began at 8:00 am and ran until 2:00 pm. This year's blood drives look a little different. With the current COVID regulations, the American Red Cross has numerous safety protocols to keep each donor safe during the donation period. The number of available appointment times has been limited to allow for disinfection and distancing between donors. However, this did not deter local staff and students. Out of the 22 individuals that donated, 6 donors were composed of staff and students. The blood drive was considered a success by reaching our goal of 20 units collected. Although there are many benefits to donating blood, the number of units collected through the school translates into a \$250-\$500 scholarship for a local Scribner-Snyder senior.
