#### **School Closing/Dismissal Information**

- \*Please understand that safety for students is the main concern in the decision to close schools.
- \*When school is dismissed early for bad weather, students who drive their own vehicles and live outside the city limits will be required to contact their parents by telephone prior to leaving school.
- \*Bus/van students will ride home as usual.
- \*My main contact is KTIC AM 840 & FM 107.9 radio and TV channels 3, 6, or 7 in Omaha for any school closing, late start, or early dismissal due to threatening weather. I will also attempt to contact KFAB 1110 radio.
- \*We will also send out an all call to family's phones through School Messenger
- \*On late starts, we typically plan to start school 2 hours late. We realize that some roads are more hazardous than others and we do not expect students or parents to endanger their safety in order to get to school. If a student legitimately cannot get to school because of weather conditions, they will be excused.


The Trojan Hut is part of the Entrepreneurship class, and in addition to making apparel, they are working through a project that simulates creating their own business. By the end of the year,

students will have worked through all parts of the process, including idea creation, business plan, marketing, and finances.

The Personal Finance class just wrapped up the module on banking. They learned about the different bank options, including accounts they can open that would benefit them. After each of their modules they play a Life Happens game, where they roll the dice to determine what happens to them in the game. This has been a fun way for students to understand and critically think about different parts of their life in regards to finances.

In the Media Center, elementary students ended the week reading books about Thanksgiving, making "Gobble Up a Good Book" book recommendation crafts, and creating Thanksgiving stories using a roll-astory format. It was fun to see all of their creativity while writing the stories! December will be a fun month in the Media Center as well. Students will hear stories and practice library skills using the theme of Christmas.

The third grade class has been very busy during this second quarter of the school year. Kids are working on how to multiply and divide numbers using different methods and strategies. We have also been exploring static electricity and electrical currents in science. Our year has been very productive and we are all working very hard in the classroom. It certainly has been busy, but we have a great group this



year that is working hard and doing a very nice job in the classroom! It's a great day to be a Trojan in third grade!

### Sixth graders learn about 3D printing

The sixth grade just finished their reading unit called Designing the Future. Part of this unit focused on the incredible things 3D printers can create. The students were fascinated that there are now ways to make edible food with 3D printers! Along with learning that these machines can print food, we learned how these printers can help in the medical field and with transportation. Scribner-Snyder is lucky enough to have their own 3D printer here at school. We took a stroll down the hallway to visit with Nick Ell who is our technology coordinator through the ESU. Nick showed us how the printers work and was printing a few things while we visited. He took the time to answer our questions and really further sparked the interest of the students being able to see the machine in action!

## Nebraska is home to some incredible colleges that

offer great academic experiences. These institutions also extend a helping hand to make your college journey not just educational but also affordable.

- **1. Nebraska Promise:** Tuition at the University of Nebraska's four campuses (UNL, UNO, UNK, & NCTA) can be covered if your family's income is \$65,000 or less (Adjusted Gross Income) or you are a Pell Grant recipient. In addition, keep those grades up with a 2.5 GPA, and you are golden. Mark your calendars for the May 1, 2024 deadline and get all the details at <a href="Nebraska">Nebraska</a> Promise.
- **2. Nebraska State College Tuition Guarantee:** Thinking of going to Chadron, Peru, or Wayne State College? You can receive free tuition at these schools. If you are a first-time freshman or a transfer student, eligible for Pell Grants, and can commit to at least 12 credit hours per semester (including some on-campus classes). The deadline is April 1, 2024. Check out <u>NSCS</u> for more info.
- **3. Access NWU (Nebraska Wesleyan University):** If you're eligible for the federal Pell Grant, planning to start college in 2024, and carry a full academic load of 12-18 credit hours per semester, you will qualify for Access NWU. The deadline is March 1, 2024. Details at Access NWU Scholarship.


**How to apply for these programs?** File the FAFSA when it opens sometime in December. You may be asked to verify some information with the financial aid offices.

Will I get a Pell Grant? Your FAFSA results will determine if you qualify for a Pell Grant.

What expenses do these programs cover? Tuition only.

**Should I still apply for other scholarships?** Absolutely! Other scholarships can help with those extra college costs.

**How do I get more info?** Reach out to your school counselor, the college financial aid office, or contact your nearest <u>EducationQuest office</u>.
