It is my hope that everyone had an enjoyable Holiday with families. I am grateful for the opportunity to greet students as they come back from break so excited to share their holiday stories.

The month of January has come in with a roar causing several days of school dismissal. At this point in time, we have not made any decision to make up any days. If we will need to make up days, we will communicate these in a timely manner to help you with your planning.

As I have reported through multiple newsletters, the School Board has been working with DLR Group (an architectural firm) to conduct a facility study to help address the facility needs of the district. DLR staff, at the board work meeting in January, worked with the board and spent some time in the district confirming previous findings that they related to board goals to address future facility needs. The architects left with confirmation of their previous findings and will be working on schematic design of future facilities as well as possible options of renovating current facilities. More to come on this subject in the future.

You may have also heard that the old high school building is being sold to a development group that will be renovating it into apartments. That is correct. We are in negotiations with them to bring this process to fruition. If you have any questions about future facility plans or on the old building renovation, please do not hesitate to contact me.

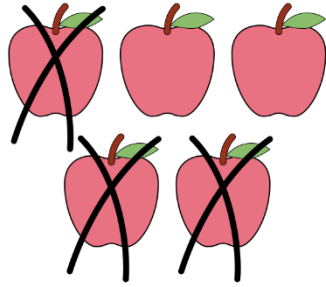

2023-2024 First Grade Class

The SSCS first-grade class has already come a long way since we began school in August. The students have worked hard to learn new skills and strategies to help them solve whatever problems they may face. Below is a brief summary of what we have learned throughout the first semester in each subject area.



$$5 - 3 = 2$$



$$3 - 4 = -1$$

In math we have learned many strategies to help us add and subtract within 20. By the end of the year, the students will be able to add and subtract two-digit numbers together using many different strategies. Currently, we are taking a break from addition and subtraction, and are now learning about 2-dimensional and 3-dimensional shapes and their attributes.

Additionally, throughout the semester, we have been learning how to read a story and use many skills and strategies to help us understand the selection. A few strategies that we have worked on include making and confirming predictions, recognizing the point of view of the narrator, and using text/graphic features to clarify an informational text.

So far this year we have learned to read and write many High Frequency Words! Many of these words are very tricky to learn, because you can't always rely on sounds to figure out how to read and spell them. We have also been working on learning spelling rules. We started off looking at words, and learning the short vowel sounds (cap), and have worked up to learning more challenging rules such as the bossy "e" working with vowels to help them say their names (cape).

In science, we have learned a lot about the structures and functions of plants, as well as what they need in order to grow. We also just finished learning about how sound waves and vibrations make the sounds that we hear every day.

In social studies, we have spent a lot of time studying how everything can change over time. We learned to see how everyday things that we see and use now have changed from what they were like in the past. We also spent some time learning about a few important people and events in our history, and how we have many different holidays to celebrate and honor them.

The 2023-2024 first graders have worked incredibly hard to learn and grow this past semester. They should be proud of what they have accomplished. I am excited to see how much they will grow by the end of the school year.

Annual FFA BBQ/Pie Auction approaching!

The spring semester is looking to be a busy one for the Scribner-Snyder FFA Chapter! It is filled with applications, contests, events, conventions, banquet, and more.

Proficiency and State Degree applications are due at the beginning of February. We have several members applying for their State Degree this year: Jill Adams, Krista Beranek, Izzy Carrier, Hannah Ryun, Ashley Stadt and Kadyr Wheelock. Along with an application, there is an interview process that must be completed for this. The State Degree is the highest award that the state association can bestow upon its members. A minimum requirement for time and/or money invested in a supervised agricultural experience (aka – a job, preferably in agriculture), FFA activities, community service hours, etc. must be achieved to attain this recognition. Agricultural Proficiency Awards honor FFA members who, through supervised agricultural experiences, have developed specialized skills that they can apply toward their future careers. Students can compete for awards in nearly 50 areas ranging from agricultural communications to wildlife management. We have several students who will compete in areas like Hospitality and Management, Poultry Production, and Equine Placement. The application for this consists of several short answer questions, financial statements, skill and competencies reflections, and photos of them in action.

FFA Week activities are also in the planning stages! Scribner-Snyder FFA enjoys celebrating the National FFA Organization and promoting FFA to our school and community. Face painting for the elementary students, drive

your farm machinery to school day, official dress day, snack attack (providing a snack to the junior high and high school students), agricultural trivia, a hidden owl around school, and elementary lessons are just a few of the activities that are planned for National FFA Week (officially February 19-23, but will be celebrated March 4-8). This helps the chapter to let the school and community know more about agriculture and the National FFA Organization.

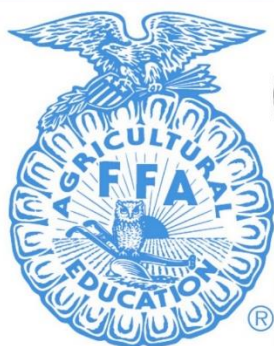

A few students from Scribner-Snyder are excited to participate in The World Food Prize, Nebraska Youth Institute in March. This event takes place at the University of Nebraska – Lincoln. The goal of this institute is to help students engage in ending hunger and poverty. Students research a country with a global challenge, write a paper about that country, and propose a solution to their problem. These students earn a \$500 College of Agricultural Sciences and Natural Resources scholarship and become recognized as Borlaug Scholars.

We would like to send out a special shout out to those from our community that donated their time to judge our Leadership Development Events last fall: Mishele and Dan Beerbohm, Pastor Bruce Schut, Jordan Young, Kelly Schnoor, and Beth Boyle. This contest would not be possible without the generosity of their time!

Community service is another area in which our chapter is always trying to fulfill. Last fall we held a food drive at the school. This yielded over 1,100 items to go toward the Faith Food Pantry! Any opportunity in which we can give back to our community, we are more than happy to do so.

Coming up this spring, the Scribner-Snyder FFA members are also looking forward to participating in District Career Development Events and the Nebraska State FFA Convention. State Convention is three days which provide so many opportunities for our students. We have several students earning the right to compete in contests including: Natural Resources, Meats, Ag Literacy Speaking (Aydia Ryun), Senior Public Speaking (Zoey Gathman), and Agriscience. In addition to contests, we are hoping to have a display for the hall of chapters. The junior high members enjoy participating in the Quiz Bowl at State Convention. Shortly after convention is over, we will be holding chapter officer interviews and our recognition banquet (April 22nd). May brings our petting zoo, family picnic, and Chapter Officer Leadership Training.

Another exciting opportunity that our chapter is working towards is putting up a greenhouse. We are trying to find enough funding to get this project accomplished! Our science and ag classes would directly benefit from a space like this, but there are several other opportunities for elementary classrooms to utilize the space, or for produce to be used in the school cafeteria. What's Happening in High School Science

Biology: Currently, the ninth-grade students are exploring macromolecules, such as carbohydrates, lipids, and proteins. Students have completed several scientific investigations throughout this module. For example, one lab involved the testing of various food items for the presence of starch. Another lab allowed students to observe and understand the importance of enzyme activity. Moving forward, students will begin focusing on the topic of cells. Students will learn how a cell is affected by its environment, how our cells obtain energy, and understand how genetics play a role in our cells.

Physical Science: First semester, tenth-grade students focused heavily on the concepts of motion, forces, and energy. These areas did require quite a bit of math calculations. However, in attempts to add some physical exercise to our physical science classroom, students stepped outside to throw frisbees and footballs to calculate throwing speeds. Second semester we will shift our content towards various chemistry topics. Classification of matter, properties of elements, and chemical reactions are just a few of the modules that will be covered.

Chemistry: This group of students has been working hard this year. At the beginning of the year, chemistry students reviewed systems of measurement, scientific notation, and significant figures. Students also learned how to convert between atomic mass, moles, and atoms. Also, the relationship between frequency and wavelength of light was introduced. Needless to say, students have been giving their calculators a workout. We will move away from the calculators to finish up the year by talking about electron configurations and chemical bonding.

Anatomy and Physiology: Anatomy students have been progressing their way through the human body. Initially, students studied the different types of cells and tissues in the body. Students then uncovered the layers of the integumentary system. Students have also made their way through the bones of the skeletal system and are continuing to learn about the muscular system. They will feel a sense of accomplishment as they master all the bones and muscles of the body by the end of the year.

2024–25 FAFSA® Form Launch The 2024–25 *Free*

Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA®) form is now available. You can complete the form to apply for financial aid to help pay for attendance at college between July 1, 2024, and June 30, 2025. However, there may be pauses for site maintenance to make technical updates as needed to provide a better experience.

What's New The 2024–25 FAFSA form expands eligibility for federal student aid, including Pell Grants, and provides a streamlined user experience. 610,000 new students from low-income backgrounds will be eligible to receive Federal Pell Grants due to updates to student aid calculations. Plus, applicants will be able to skip as many as 26 questions, depending on their individual circumstances. Some applicants could answer as few as 18 questions, which could take less than 10 minutes.

What Happens After You Submit When you submit your completed 2024–25 FAFSA form, you'll get an email confirming that we received your form with preliminary information related to your eligibility for federal student aid. This will include your estimated Student Aid Index (SAI) and estimated eligibility for Federal Pell Grants. Your FAFSA eligibility information will be sent to your school(s) and state in late January, so you will have ample time to fill out the form and do not need to rush to complete the form during the soft launch. Once your school(s) receive your FAFSA information, they will provide you with personalized aid information in the coming weeks. Until your school(s) and state receive your form, they won't be able to answer questions about your aid eligibility or status.

You will receive an email when your FAFSA information has been sent to your selected schools and when you can access your FAFSA Submission Summary on StudentAid.gov. The FAFSA Submission Summary will provide your official SAI calculation and Federal Pell Grant eligibility. You can also check the status of your FAFSA form on StudentAid.gov in late January.
