Wow! The school year is over halfway done! This year the middle school science classes are working hard and having fun! The 6th grade class have been busy learning about Life Structure and Function. They are currently focusing on Reproduction of plants and animals. We will soon get to dissection with worms and owl pellets.

The 7th graders just finished their textbook called The Changing Earth. In this book the students learned about how the Earth changes over time with Plate Tectonics, volcanoes, and mountain building. The next book we will get into is Earth's Resources. The 7th grade received their rainbow trout eggs in January that they are raising in an aquarium provided by the Nebraska Game & Parks. The students are very excited to see how they grow and get a chance to dissect a trout (not the ones we raise!) We will take a field trip to Schramm Park in Gretna to release the trout and learn more about ecosystems.

The 8th graders are working on their second textbook about Energy and Motion! In this textbook, they have been studying about motion, speed and acceleration. They started the school year with Change Over Time and will continue with Humans and Their Place in the Universe. With this book, they will build model rockets, and we will have a launch day.

The freshmen World Geography class are currently learning about Ancient Rome.

Lifetime Physical Education class has been busy learning about archery, Bowhunter Education, strength and conditioning, bocce ball, trapping, and other activities that they can do in everyday life. We will soon get into learning about darts, Boater Safety and fishing. Another favorite is how to use a grill and smoker, where the class will get to do some cooking!

The school year is going by fast! I know the students look forward to the end of the year, but we have a lot to learn before the school year ends!






Career Development Conference Work

What is the FAFSA, and why does It matter?

FAFSA stands for Free Application for Federal Student Aid. It's the form that determines your eligibility for <u>financial aid</u>, which includes grants, need-based scholarships, workstudy jobs, and student loans.

Whether you're planning to attend a four-year university, community college, or trade school, filling out the FAFSA ensures that you're not leaving free money on the table. In 2023 alone, it's estimated that Nebraskans missed out on \$24 million in Pell Grants by not filing the FAFSA. That translates to a mind-boggling amount of missed opportunities for students.

Common FAFSA myths...and the truth.

Do any of these statements ring true for you? It's time to rethink your viewpoint!

- "My family makes too much money, so I won't qualify."
- You may still be eligible for school-based scholarships and low-interest student loans.

Many schools require a FAFSA on file to award any aid, regardless of income.

- "FAFSA is only for students going to a university."
- Nope! FAFSA can be used for trade schools, community colleges, and technical programs—not just four-year schools.
- "Filing the FAFSA is too complicated."
- While gathering some financial information is required, the FAFSA Simplification Act

has made the process easier than ever!

When should I file?

The FAFSA typically opens each year on Oct. 1 (though for 2024, it opened in December due to changes in the form). Since some aid is first-come, first-served, you'll want to submit your FAFSA as soon as possible. Nebraska colleges and programs have their own deadlines, so don't wait until the last minute!

How do I get started?

 Create an FSA ID at <u>studentaid.gov</u>. You and a parent/guardian (if applicable) will need one.

- 2. **Gather necessary documents**, including tax returns, W-2s, Social Security Numbers, etc.
- 3. Complete the FAFSA form online—most students finish in under an hour!
- 4. Review your Student Aid Report (SAR) and correct any errors.
- 5. Check with your chosen college or program to ensure they received your FAFSA.

What if I need help?

EducationQuest has a variety of resources to help you navigate the process, including:

- **FAFSA Checklist:** The EducationQuest <u>FAFSA Checklist</u> will tell you all the materials needed to complete the form and where to find them.
- **FAFSA Demo:** Watch the EducationQuest <u>short video tutorial</u> to prepare. It will show you what to expect and how to avoid common mistakes.
- **Personalized Assistance:** Schedule an appointment with EducationQuest's college planning specialists for one-on-one support. It's FREE!
- Videos: Visit the EducationQuest <u>YouTube channel</u> for a variety of videos and livestreams that will give you insight into filing the FAFSA and college planning.

Filing the FAFSA is one of the most important steps you can take toward an affordable education. Even if you think you won't qualify, fill it out anyway. You might be surprised at the financial aid available to you!
