School Closing/Dismissal Information

*Please understand that safety for students is the main concern in the decision to close schools.

*When school is dismissed early for bad weather, students who drive their own vehicles and live outside the city limits will be required to contact their parents by telephone prior to leaving school.

*Bus/Van students will ride the bus/van home as usual.

*Parents are asked to listen to KFAB 1110 radio, KTIC 107.9 (The Bull), or Channels 3, 6, or 7 in Omaha, and the School Website for any school closings, late starts, or early dismissals in case the weather is threatening.

*On late starts, we typically plan to start school 2 hours late. We realize that some roads are more hazardous than others and we do not expect students or parents to endanger their safety in order to get to school. If a student legitimately cannot get to school because of weather conditions, they will be excused.

*In case of late starts, early dismissals, and/or school closings a message will also be sent out on School Messenger

Trifecta of Languages

Why? “Because French.” In Room 402, one will hear this as a common response to a student’s puzzled demeanor while learning French. Mrs. Danielle Schroetlin has been a teacher for fifteen years, with this being her ninth year at Scribner-Snyder Community Schools. She teaches French and Spanish. She earned her degree at Wayne State College in Nebraska.



Schroetlin doesn’t do anything in the classroom for Halloween, but in her Spanish classes they celebrate Day of the Dead, which is November first and second. They talk about why the Spanish cultures celebrate the holiday, and then have a fiesta to celebrate.

On a scale from 1-10, Mrs. Schroetlin would rate the first quarter an 8. She is doing a lot of cool activities in the classroom and said, “...the kids are excited to be back in school so there’s always that good energy at the beginning of the year. So hopefully that can continue throughout the rest of the year.”

Her favorite part of teaching different languages is teaching the beginning parts with the numbers, colors, and the alphabet. “It’s easy so the kids tend to pick it up really nice. They’re excited about it and there aren’t a lot of worksheets; we do games and songs and stuff so that’s always a lot of fun.”

Beyond the English language, Mrs. Schroetlin also knows Spanish, French, and Sign Language. The only language she would consider herself to be fluent in is English, but she said she’s pretty close in Spanish. She can read French, but doesn’t speak it as fluently as she would like, and she’s pretty decent at sign language.

The first time Mrs. Schroetlin learned any sign language was in elementary school when they learned the alphabet in class. She didn’t learn Spanish or French until she got into

high school when she took Spanish her freshman year, and French her junior year. A few years ago, when she was at church, she started picking up more sign language.

When learning new languages, Mrs. Schroetlin found that going from French to Spanish was easy because they're both Latin languages and there's a lot of similarities in the words and the structure. She knew about conjugation, adjective-noun agreement, and masculine and feminine so there wasn't a barrier there. She added, "Sign language was completely different because there's no solid structure as far as rigid things so it's a lot of memorizing."

Mrs. Schroetlin has taught her children a little bit of the languages she knows. "All three of them sign a little bit; my oldest daughter really got into Spanish, so she knows some, and the middle one really liked French, so I've been working French with her but they're not fluent. They just know numbers, colors, letters, and basic things."

She believes there are many benefits to knowing multiple languages. "In this part of the country, I think it's really beneficial to know Spanish because there is a large population here. It can help you get a job and get paid more. It helps me learn English better, and it just triggers a part of the brain; it's like a puzzle and so it makes your brain kind of work a little bit."

Mrs. Schroetlin has taught many students the languages of French and Spanish. Although parts of the languages can be confusing to learn, such as the grammar in French through the conjugations and noun agreements. She has done a great job guiding students.

Where the Heart Is

Joyful. Passionate. Caring. Optimistic. Invested. These are all fitting adjectives to describe one of the veteran teachers at Scribner-Snyder Elementary School, Mrs. Wuestewald. She has been teaching at Scribner-Snyder Elementary School for 32 years and currently teaches second grade. She worked at a rural school for two years teaching kindergarten through sixth grade and at Snyder Elementary School teaching a combination room of third and fourth graders.

Every educator has a reason as to why they become a teacher, "I wanted to be a teacher because in the summertime in my college years I worked in a daycare...so they had me do preschool activities in the daycare. Then I decided, 'Oh, instead of going into social service, I'm going to go into teaching, because I enjoy doing that'."

When asked why Wuestewald chose second grade she responded, "I liked second grade because I like the little-er students. I enjoyed teaching fourth graders, but the second graders were just really eager to learn...They're just really enthusiastic and I guess I just wanted a grade change."



The first quarter is coming to an end and Wuestewald said, "I think the year is going really good; I've got eighteen great students, they're smiling, they're happy to be here. I'm excited to teach them, and I just think we're off to a great start."

Some teachers have moments when they are proud of what they do. Wuestewald explained, "...When the students are doing well academically and behaviorally, and I feel like I have really gotten across to them, and they have learned a lot, and they're successful, then I'm really proud."

When asked which subject she likes the most she said, "My favorite lesson to teach. I like all of them, but I probably like math the best. I guess I like working with numbers and it's fun to see their little light bulb go off in their head when they get the concept or the skill..."

Wuestewald has always incorporated a party into Halloween. "For Halloween in second grade we have a Halloween party, so the students sign up for treats and games and prizes and drinks. On Halloween we play games and then we enjoy drinks and snacks." She has always let the students wear their Halloween costumes for the party, but they aren't allowed to wear them all day because they could get distracted.

As a veteran at Scribner-Snyder Elementary School, she still has a lot of passion and care for her students and their education.

When asked why she thinks Personal Finance should be required here at Scribner-Snyder High School she said, "Every student, no matter their future goals or professions, will have to deal with the things we learn in class. For most people they are not things that are automatic but must be learned. Knowledge is power when it comes to money."

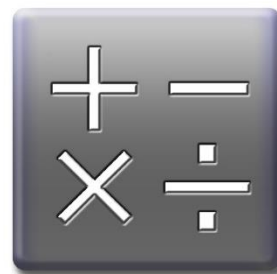
During this event, students can visit 78 college booths, chat with college reps, and view live college-prep presentations. Students, family members, and counselors can register at eqf.org/collegefair.
