Due to COVID-19 last year, schools had to shut down their salad bars. This year the COVID cases have decreased, allowing some schools to bring it back. "That's fantastic. We (kitchen staff) love that you (students) can get your own stuff; we can give you more options, (and it's) less work."

One lesson that Mrs. Lundry has learned: you have to think on your feet. "...you've got to be flexible and that you've got to roll with the punches. If something is out of stock, you're going to have to make do with something else."

Earlier this year Cherry Blossom Chicken was out of stock so Lundry covered popcorn chicken in sweet and sour sauce; there was only one kid that questioned it. Mrs. Lundry does have some favorite meals to make like corn dogs. "...It's easy and I can get paperwork and ordering done and work on the next months' menus."

Just because her job is cooking for a school doesn't mean she always enjoys it (food preparation). She expressed that she dislikes cooking at home after a long day of cooking at school.

Mrs. Lundry said that one reward about working at the school is that she gets to see her children every day. When asked what Lundry enjoyed most about leading the food service program here at S-S, she stated, "I enjoy knowing that I am providing healthy meals for the children."

As the fall season approaches, Lundry is looking forward to cooler temperatures not only outside, but "It's cooler in the kitchenm she added."

One rewarding part of his job is to help kids learn new material. "...It's rewarding to see kids come in not knowing something and later in the year seeing them grow and grow and learn new things."

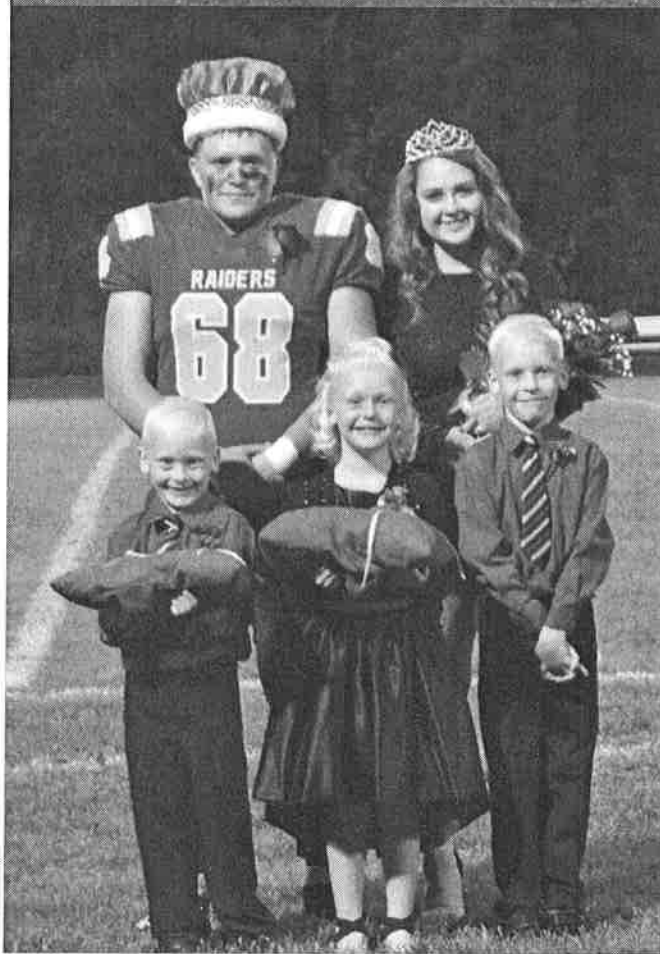
