In addition, the number of children identified as eligible for this program determines the amount of money our school receives for Title I, state aid, and several other state and federal programs and grants. Even if your child does not eat lunch at school, and even though lunch and breakfast are free again this year, completing an application form can help generate needed state and federal funds for our instructional programs. I am looking forward to working with a new generation of students within the community and helping our young adults learn and grow into confident, prepared individuals for the real-world.

Language Arts has always been my favorite subject since I was a young child and bringing out each students' talents and skills that will help them reach their highest potential will always be our academic goals in the areas of English, Public Speaking and Journalism.

9th grade English is designed to give all freshmen an opportunity to sample and be exposed to each main literary genre and subgenres, review grammatical rules and functions, and become even more confident in their personal narrative, opinion, and expository writing abilities. We are currently reading short stories from a variety of genres and reviewing independent and active reading comprehension skills while reviewing literary and figurative language terminology. English 1 is the foundation for the rest of the students' high school Language Arts experience.

Sophomores are currently focusing on the commonly used literary formula, the "Hero's Journey". Students are beginning their first major piece of writing for the school year, the personal narrative, where they will be reflecting on their own personal journeys

from their past and writing a visual retelling of the experience itself and the lesson learned from that personal experience. Sophomores also take Public Speaking first semester. They have just completed their Declamation speeches and are now focusing on their Demonstration/"How To" presentations.

The 11th graders have been discussing, creating, and reading about the universal theme "Identity/Individuality" and the 12th graders have begun the compare-contrast essay unit. 10th, 11th and 12th graders also have the option to be a part of the Yearbook staff where we have been learning the ins and outs of Photojournalism, cover design, theme conception, and photo editing. 11th and 12th graders in Journalism class are starting the year off with opinion writing and composing editorials this month.

The 2021-2022 school year already feels like a welcoming and fun-filled learning atmosphere. I'm excited to be back, teaching in the district.

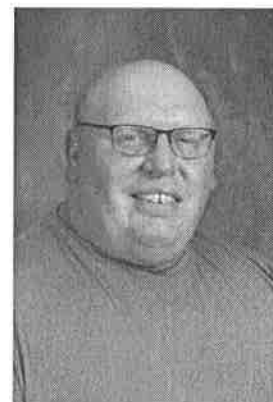
